Question and answers provided during the meeting:

Question	Answer
Do the property crime statistics include felonies?	Yes, this includes felonies, residential robberies, and other crimes not against a person. Thefts of \$950.00 or less.
What would happen if someone was forced to defend themselves upon robbery in the home?	You have a right to defend yourself. There will be an investigation to determine the justification of the self-defense.
What do you recommend for neighborhoods to prepare for an emergency?	Anaheim Police Department recommends to get to know your neighbors, participate in your neighborhood watch, exchange phone numbers, and be vigilant of your surroundings.
If there is a no trespassing sign on your property, does it protect you?	The sign can serve as a deterrent for some people.
What are you doing to address illegal dumping?	We see illegal dumping constantly throughout the city around the 1 st of month. Please use the Anaheim Anytime application. The illegal dumpers have to be caught in the act. Capture a license plate if possible, but please do not confront.
What are you doing to address graffiti?	Our graffiti contractor is on the My Anaheim application and Anaheim Anytime . Graffiti is removed usually within 24 hours of the initial report. They also provide paint supplies to residents that can address small graffiti issues.
What about abandoned cars and vehicles obtaining multiple parking citations?	We do keep track of that. There are certain citable threshold necessary for the cars to be towed after a certain amount of tickets or the amount of time the vehicle has been at the location.

<p>Can we submit complaints regarding abandoned vehicles in Spanish?</p>	<p>Yes, you can write up the Anaheim Anytime report in Spanish and we can have it translated so that it can be addressed.</p>
<p>What about loud parties and music after hours?</p>	<p>We do have an ordinance enforced by our Police Department. I do recommend contacting your Community Policing Team because they can cite the property owner. This is preferable as opposed to calling dispatch because police resources are busier.</p>
<p>How was the Redistricting map data collected?</p>	<p>These numbers are based on what was submitted in the 2020 Census. It was either provided by the property owner or resident at that time.</p>
<p>Which districts are most impacted by the population changes?</p>	<p>With the six districts, we are looking at 58,000 people per district. Districts 1, 2, 6 are very close but Districts 3, 4, 5 have the larger population shifts.</p>
<p>Is there a rebate program for solar?</p>	<p>We have Net Metering, which is not incentive based but rather is a credit for energy saved.</p>
<p>Is the Emergency Preparedness class this Saturday?</p>	<p>Yes, the 23rd is this coming Saturday.</p>
<p>Will we have this Emergency Preparedness symposium again?</p>	<p>We certainly want to create as many symposiums as possible depending on its popularity.</p>
